Background Information

CREWS is organizing a one-week event for its Members in Malawi from the **9th to the 13th of February 2026**. CREWS Members are invited to participate in person to the following activities in Lilongwe (to be confirmed), Blantyre and Zomba, Malawi:

- 22nd CREWS Steering Committee Meeting
- Discussions with national partners in Malawi on the current status of their early warning systems, challenges, opportunities for CREWS to further support and scale up
- Discussions with CREWS Implementing Partners in Malawi on significant outputs, project status and lessons learned so far
- Carry out visit to communities to showcase the implementation progress on community-based activities with the WMO and the Malawi Red Cross in Zomba and the radar site supported by the World Bank

- High-level launch of CREWS strategic outputs

CREWS Chair together with the WMO Secretary-General to pay a courtesy visit to the Malawi President (TBC) and Malawi Minister of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Climate Change scheduled on the 9th of February 2026 to discuss about the Meteorological Bill and Policy supported by CREWS, World Bank and WMO .

As part of preparations for the upcoming CREWS field mission to Malawi, the Secretariat has undertaken a carbon footprint analysis to estimate and offset the emissions associated with participant travel of approximately **223 tonnes of CO₂** over a total of 261,580 km traveled by participants, covering flights, car transfers, events, and site visits. In line with CREWS' commitment to climate-responsible action, we explored offset options through the **United Nations online platform for voluntary cancellation of Certified Emission Reductions (CERs) 2025**, which features UNFCCC-certified projects that reduce, avoid, or remove greenhouse gas emissions. A final Malawi-based projects were identified - [Improved Cook Stove Project in Nkhata Bay District](#) (USD 15 per tonne). Offsetting the estimated emissions would cost **USD 3,405**, based on estimated number of participants (30-40 participants, including CREWS Members, Implementing Partners, invited Observers) and the proposed agenda.

Arthur Peter Mutharika (/mu:tə'ri:kə/ moot-ə-REE-kə; born 18 July 1940) is a Malawian politician and lawyer who served as the fifth president of Malawi from 2014 to 2020. Having won the 2025 presidential election as the candidate of the Democratic Progressive Party (DPP), he is the president-elect and is set to be inaugurated as the seventh president.

Brief Background:

The first weather radar system in Malawi is installed under the World Bank-supported Malawi Watershed Services Improvement Project (MWASIP), programme being leveraged by CREWS Malawi. It is located at Kasamba Hills in Zalewa, in the Shire River Basin, an area highly prone to heavy rainfall and flooding, and occasionally by cyclones. This basin was prioritized because communities there face repeated losses of lives, crops, and infrastructure due to flash floods and severe weather.

The radar will give forecasters real-time information on rainfall and storms, improving the accuracy of early warnings and helping communities prepare and respond more effectively.

CREWS provided vital technical assistance, not only to support the radar setup but also to build the capacity of DCCMS staff. Capacity building activities included how to properly manage the entire process — from development of technical specifications to installation and long-term use and maintenance of the weather radar. In addition, forecasters have been trained on radar data and product interpretation and use. Lessons learned and Technical Assistance will also support the 2nd Radar (in the Central Malawi) under the 2nd Regional Program for Climate Resilience (RCRP2) for Malawi, in order to ensure interoperability between the two radars and the development and use of a radar composite/mosaic.

Brief Background:

The Masongola ward in Zomba city is one of the communities supported by the CREWS Malawi programme. Zomba city is in southern Malawi located at the foot of Zomba Plateau and used to be the capital of Malawi. The climate is cooler, and it is surrounded by mountains and gardens. Agriculture and small trade are the main economic activities.

The WMO and the Malawi Red Cross supported capacity building of the community leaders in Masongola ward in early warning, preparedness and early action. As of date, gender risk assessments have been conducted, hazard maps were developed, SOPs were developed, disseminated and shared and 10 Ward Disaster Risk Management Committees were strengthened, and leaders were trained to improve coordination and strengthen community engagement. Small equipment was also provided that are being used to disseminate early warning and for preparedness activities (i.e. smart phones, reflector vests, gumboots, whistles and torches). Protective gears were also distributed for rescue operations.

Special thanks to the Malawi Department of Climate Change and Meteorological Services (DCCMS), WMO and World Bank for coordinating the agenda and logistical arrangements with the CREWS Secretariat.
